Nicolls Nuggets

Holidays are a time for families. We gather together to enjoy the warmth and the company of our relatives, our in-laws (and outlaws), and to remember the past events that bind us to each other. All families have a history and need to understand the importance of recording the major landmarks of the past.

What follows are "nuggets" from the past as related by Aunt Marge Ohl, in her excellent history, <u>Ten Generations of the</u> Nicolls Family in America, that

she published in 1981. Her research and documentation provide an outstanding history of the Nicolls Family. In reading that excellent family history, some interesting facts are revealed about those who came before us. progress in their training and development. Coach Tressel remarked: "I just can't believe how far along these boys have come in a year's time. **Titanic Tyler** is really putting on some serious poundage to plug the gaps in the line and has incredible speed for a big guy. **Lumbering Logan** is going to be a huge force in moving the ball forward and is a superior ball-handler even at his tender age. There's just no telling how dominant these two will turn out to be in the future. I know I'll be accused of hyperbole but doggone it, they look like future Ist round draft picks to me."

- William Nicolls, the earliest ancestor identified, came from Ireland in the mid 1700s, with his wife and two sons.
- The first two generations of the family lived in the State of New York during the period of the Revolutionary War.
- The third Nicolls generation ventured westward and settled in Crawford County, Pennsylvania, in 1838. Simon Nicolls died in 1844 and is buried in Conneautville Cemetery.
- Sylvester Emmett Nicolls headed the sixth Nicolls generation and married Harriet E. Beebe on March 2, 1899, in Conneautville, Pennsylvania.
- Their family included 12 children. The oldest, Carl Emmett, was born on February 20, 1900, in Crawford County, Pennsylvania.
- Carl helped his father on the farm until he went to Poland, Ohio in about 1920, and started working in a grocery store owned by Mr. McCrone.
- Carl married Ethel Mae McCoy of Poland, Ohio, on June 6, 1921.
- Grandpa and Grandma Nicolls lived in the Old Stone Tavern in Poland until moving to the family house on Delaware Avenue in mid-1923. There they reared their six children and were prominent members of the Poland community and the Poland Methodist Church.
- The Poland, Ohio, Nicolls family name and tradition has been carried on by the six offspring of Carl and Ethel. Genealogical records show that this family has grown to a total of 18 grandchildren, 31 great-grandchildren, and 4 great-great- grand-children, subject to the author's miscalculations. Aunt Ruth Ann tells me that her brothers used to call Grandma Ethel "FERTILE MYRTLE", which has certainly proved to be true!
